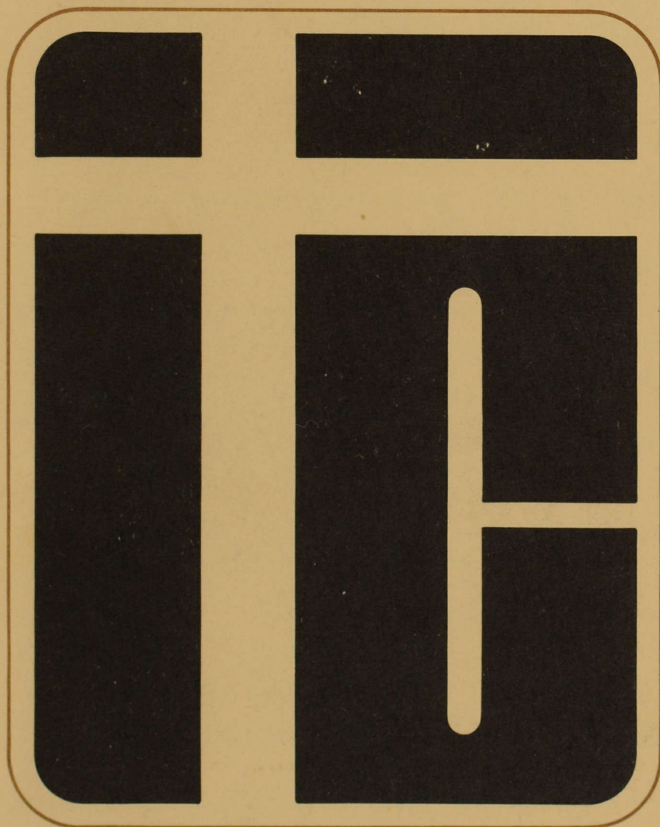

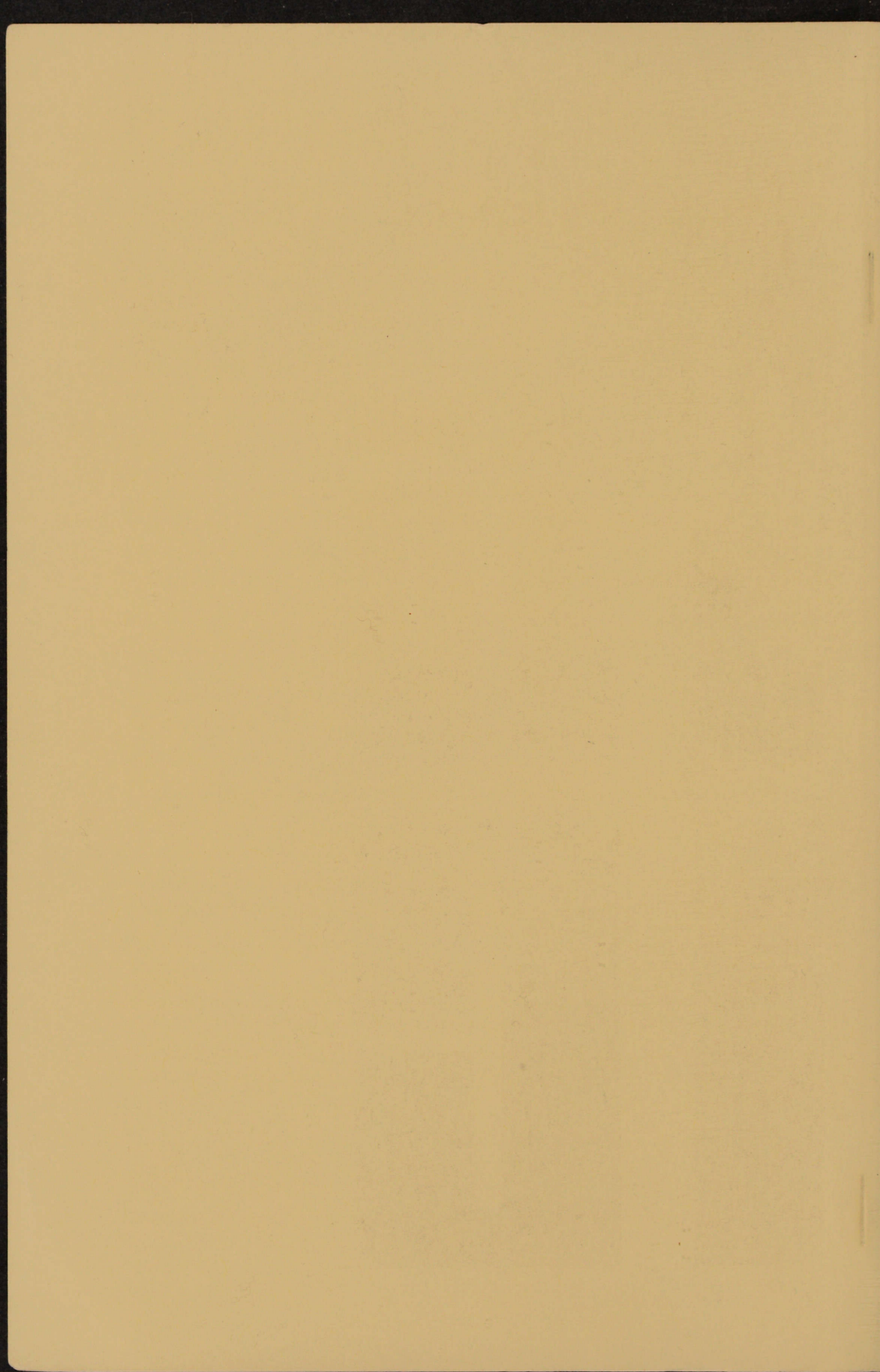

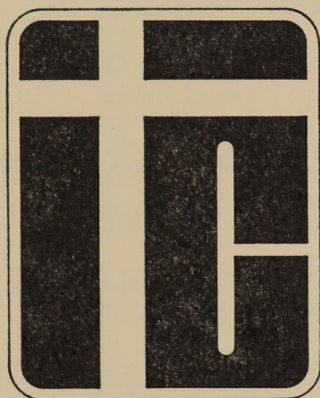

Rev. Charles Shelby Rooks is Executive Director of The Fund For Theological Education, Inc.


Dr. Thomas J. Pugh received his Ph.D. from Boston University and is Professor of Psychology and Pastoral Care at The Interdenominational Theological Center.

Editorial Comment

This issue of The Journal of The Interdenominational Theological Center begins with Dr. Oswald P. Bronson's illuminating and informative historical perspective of I.T.C. He writes about I.T.C. in the context of its past, present and future directions. Dr. Josephus R. Coan gives a very succinct and acute analysis of Henry McNeal Turner from the perspective of Black liberation. Dr. Coan has a book coming out this Spring entitled "Black American Overseas Missionaries." Dr. John C. Diamond elucidates many obscure and controversial aspects of "Aulen's Demythologized Interpretation of The Demonic." Dr. Leonard Lovett does an historical investigation of the contemporary Pentecostal Movement in America with emphasis on Black Pentecostalism. Rev. James A. Joseph synthesizes the traditional polarity between universality and particularity.

In a very creative manner, Dr. James H. Cone discusses "Freedom, History, and Hope" in the context of the liberation of oppressed people. Dr. Preston N. Williams provides genuine ethical procedures for Black social action. Dr. J. Deotis Roberts gives a much needed methodological approach for a philosophical interpretation of the Black experience. By providing an historical overview of Black theological education, Rev. Charles Shelby Rooks shows the need for an increased number of Black trained ministers and Black scholars in religion.
